History Recap Over 1 Drink

15th century: Sultanate Brunei in control of Borneo. '21: Brunei visited by navigator Juan Sebastian del Cano. 1841: Control of Sarawak (granted by James Brooke). '46: Island Labuan to Britain. '88: Brunei British protectorate. 1906: Brunei administered by British resident, sultan nominal authority. '29: Start oil extraction. '41-'45: Japanese occupation. '50: Sultan Omar Ali Saifuddin III ightarrowintroduces 1st written constitution: Islam state religion, Britain in charge of defense & foreign affairs. '62: Legislative Council election results annulled after leftist Brunei People's Party (sought to remove the sultan from power) won all 10 elected seats \rightarrow sultan declares state of emergency and rules by decree. '63: Doesn't want to join Federation of Malaysia, remains a British dependency. '67: Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah. '84: Independence. '85: Brunei National Democratic Party (BNDP) legalized. '86: Brunei Solidarity National Party (BNSP) legalized. '88: Both parties banned. '90: Introduction Malay Muslim Monarchy. '95: BNSP legal again, but harassed. 2000: Civil suit against sultan's brother Jefri Bolkiah for misuse of state funds (\$2.7bln). Development other industries besides oil (tourism). '01: Auction items Jefri.'04: Reopening parliament. '07: Rainforest Declaration. Corporal punishment law criticized by Amnesty International. '14: Sharia Law (criticism human right groups).

Budget Bites

Big supermarkets: Giant.

Markets: Tamu Kianggeh, Gadong Night Market.

 Local food: Nasi Lemak, Nasi Goreng (rice dishes), Mee Goreng (noodles), Rendang Beef Tok (curry), Pineaple Cake, Katilapam (steamed snack), Kuih Calak Beef (savoury pastry), Rojak Buah (seasoned fruit),
 Seafood Masak Lemak (fish curry), Ikan Tenggiri Balado (spicy fish dish), Undang Sambal Serai Bersantan (chili coconut prawns), Serondeng Padang (chicken in pandan leaves), Ambuyat (sago balls), Puteri Nanas, Kelupis (steamed rice in leaf), Daging Masak Lada Hitam (spicy beef with potato).

Go vegan: Being vegan is surprisingly easy in
 Brunei. There are in fact a few vegetarian restaurants
 with many vegan options... check them on <u>Happy Cow</u>
 BSB.

Mama Said

BSB is generally safe, but be a bit more careful in the Kampong Ayer area.

Alcohol and drugs are strictly prohibited in Brunei, the latter having a death sentence. Showing public affection or eating during Ramadan is also severely punished.

Brunei is a strict Muslim country and modest clothing is required. Revealing clothing (knees / shoulders / belly) is frowned upon.

Tap water is not drinkable, it should be boiled or filtered before use.

Uber / Grab doesn't exist in Brunei and taxi's are very limited (but can be found at the minibus terminal in Jalan Cator).

\$ Only cash out inside of banks, not on street ATMs.

Boycott zoos where animals are held in captivity.

Sleep Cheap

 Hostels and hotels are quite expensive in Brunei and tourism is in a beginning phase, so expect little for a lot. Booking ahead is recommendable due to limited supply of accommodations.

Go <u>Couchsurfing</u> or <u>house-sitting</u>! Also check WorkAway.

Nights Best Spent

• There is a countrywide alcohol ban. Nightlife is generally non-existent.

Free-Riding?

■ BSB has a rather compact city center, but it's really too oppressively hot walk long distances.

■ Public transport comes in the form of buses and minibuses that stop at designated stops. The main terminal is at Jalan Cator, the ground floor of a parking garage. Buses to Malaysia leave from the waterfront.

■ Uber / Grab doesn't exist and taxi transport is very limited. Find them at Jalan Cator. Sometimes regular cars stop and offer a ride for payment.

Airport: Brunei International Airport (BWN).

Hitchhiking is possible, the kind locals don't see many foreigners and are very eager to talk to them (expect a lot of giggling and staring). Due to the limited incoming stream of tourism they're not used to this situation though.
