1522: Country named after Indian chief Nicarao (by Gonzalez). '24: Granada/León founded by Cordoba. 1821: Independent from Spain. '23: United Provinces of Central America independent from Mexico / '38: fully independent. '55: William Walker in Granada →'56: Battle of Rivas/San Jacinto→'57: Walker pres.: Slavery/ planned canal →'57: defeated by Costa Rican army, executed. 1900: US/UK signed Hay-Pauncefote Treaty: canal rights (expired in '71).'09: US invasion. '12: Civil War (Managua destroyed). '27: Pres. Diaz allows US intervention → Sandino's 5-year war against US occupation / Moncada pres. '31: Earthquake Managua (12000 death). Besides a tiny supermarket at the beach there is no food for sale. Restaurants are quite overpriced. Bring some supplies from Rivas.

Free-Riding?

- From Rivas take the bus to Las Pilas, which takes you all the way into Gigante Bay. There goes only one at 2PM! It leaves Gigante at 7:30AM & 3PM. If you miss it, hitch-hiking is a thing here.
- Playa Gigante only has a dirt road and going around by foot is therefore the best way.
- Most hotels rent motorbikes.
- Taxi's are quite pricy compared to buses and take your precautions. Foreigner = money, which can attract robbers. Use only the official cabs with white-red number plate. Negotiate the price up front (per group, not per person). A taxi from Rivas should cost US\$10-15.

Tip: Download the free Triposo Nicaragua app for an offline map, offline guide & more. Load Google Maps when you have wifi and leave it open, you will still be able to use it offline.

Sleep Cheap

Many cheap, locally-owned hotels don't have a website and can't be found on booking engines. For the cheapest deals, just head to the beach without a booking and ask around. Options are Mirador, Blue Sol, Sonreir Gigante Bay and Hospedaje Cabañas de Gigante and Cabins The Pelican.

Go <u>Couchsurfing</u> or <u>house-sitting</u>! Also check <u>WorkAway</u>.

Mama Said

- Locals don't walk around at night, not even the smallest distances. There are no street lights in Playa Gigante.
- Bring enough cash as there are no ATM's here.
