History Recap Over 1 Drink

623-658: First state of Slavs: Samo's Realm. 833-900: Great Moravia. 1863: Matica Slovenka founded as cultural organization, objective: Slovak independence. 1892: Bridge across Danube connecting Hungary and Slovakia, both part of Austro-Hungarian empire. 1918: Habsburg Empire collapses after defeat in WWI > Slovaks & Czechs form Czechoslovakia. '39: Nazis dismember Czechoslavkia (as result of Munich Agreement signed by UK/France /Germany/Italy allowing annexation of Sudetenland to appease Hitler), independent Slovak Republic formed. '44: Slovak National Uprising against German occupation → Soviet Army arrives and reinstates Czechoslovakia in '45 → until '89: Communist rule. '93: Independence after Czechoslovakia splits: Democratic. '95: Treaty of Friendship and Cooperation with Hungary. 2001: Constitutional changes towards gaining membership of EU and Nato: decentralization of power to regions, strengthening of judiciary, recognition of minority rights. '04: Nato & EU. '06: Danube floods. '07: Withdrawal troops from Iraq. '09: €. New language law: Fines against official use non-Slovakian languages (Hungarian minorities mad). '10: Against dual citizenship Hungarians. '15: More and more shifting to political right-wing climate, migrant-agendas.

- **Supermarkets:** Lidl, Delia, Billa, Tesco, DM.
- **Markets:** Central Market Mileticova, Old Market Hall (Stara Trznica), Farmer's Market, Zilinska Market, Dobry Trh Market.
- **& Local food:** Bryndzové Pirohy / Brundzove Halusky (dumplings), Kapustnica (sauerkraut soup), Strapacky (sauerkraut dumplings), Liptauer (paprika-spiced cheese spread), Gulas (goulash), Vepro Knedlo Zelo (pork dumpling soup), Vyprazany Syr (fried cheese with fries and tartar sauce), Vyorazany Rezen (schnitzel), Zemiakove Placky (potato pancakes), Parené Butchy (poppyseed sweet steamed dumpling), Laskonsky (cookies), Makovnik (poppyseed roll), Trdelnik (funnel cake).
- **Go veg:** Being vegan/vegetarian is ridiculously easy in Europe, and also in Slovakia. Meatless Slovakian dishes: Vyprazany Syr (cheese though), Cesnakova Polievka (garlic soup) and Bryndzove Halusky (dumplings ask without bacon). Vegan Restaurants: Happy Cow Bratislava.

Sleep Cheap

- ♣ Hostels and alternative accommodation are very affordable in Slovakia. Check <u>Booking.com</u> for deals, but always book directly with accommodation to avoid fees. Air BnB usually has slightly cheaper deals.
- ❖ Go Couchsurfing or Housesitting (20% discount for Trusted Housesitters via this link!). Also check WorkAway or HelpX for work-exchanges. Wild camping generally not allowed, but you can get away with it if you hide well off-trail.

Free-Riding?

- Bratislava's city centre is rather compact, and most sights are at walking distance.
- Biking is another fun way to explore. There's a relatively cheap <u>bike sharing program</u> in place.
- There's an extensive bus / trolleybus / tram network in Bratislava. Tickets need to be bought before entering the bus at kiosks, vending machines and DPB offices or via the app. You can choose between 15/30/60-minutes tickets. All tickets are transferable. 50% discount for children / students / pensioners. Tickets are valid on all DPB lines within Slovakia, including night services. Tourist day tickets are way more expensive. Bratislava's central bus station (Autobusova Stanica Mlynské Nivy) is located at Chalupkova / Okrug Bratislava. Trolleybus 206 and 208, as well as bus 70 connects you with the city centre trolleybus 210 with the train station. There is a Flixbus station in Bratislava with very cheap fares to European destinations.
- Bratislava's main train station is located on:
 Námestie Franza Liszta. From there bus 93 brings you to
 the city centre (stop Hodžovo námestie) Some trains
 from Vienna arrive to the Petrzalka train station which is
 across the river, from there bus number 93 (direction
 Hlavná stanica) connects you with the city centre. Train
 tickets can be bought on the ZSSK website. I also found
 great deals on: Trainline.
- Airports: Bratislava Airport (BTS). From the main train station take bus 61 to reach the airport.
