Museums: Leeum Samsung Museum of Art, Museum Kimchi, National Museum of Modern & Contemporary Art, Children's Museum & more.

Daytrips: <u>DMZ / JSA Zone</u> (North Korea), Lotte World Amusement Park, Everland.

Budget Bites

Big supermarkets: All are expensive. Emart, Lotte and Traders (the big department stores – not the smaller versions) are the cheapest ones out there.
 Daiso for toiletries.

Markets: Namdaemun, Gwangjang,Dongdaemum, Garak, Majang Market & many more.

Local food: Kimchi (fermented vegetables), Galbi æ (marinated ribs), Yukgaejang (beef stew), Samgyetang (ginseng chicken soup), Jjajangmyeon (noodles), Gim (toasted seaweed), Gogihui (Korean BBQ), Bibimbap (mixed rice), Mandu (dumplings), Kimbap (sushi), Haemul Pajeon (fried seafood pancake), Twigim (tempura), Tteokbokki (red rice cakes), Kkwong-Toryeom (pheasant breast), Mel-Jeot (salted anchovy), Tangsuyuk (horse), Galbijjim (horse rib stew), Bulgogi (horse BBQ), Seongkae-Guk (sea urchin soup), Naengmyun (cold noodles), Godeungeo, Jeon (savory pancakes), (mackerel), Sora (turban shell), Gingyijuk / Mungejuk / Jogaejuk (rice porridge with crab / octopus / clams), Bingddeok (buckwheat rice cake), Makkoli (rice wine) & way more!

Go vegan: Being vegan quite hard in South Korea, as everything is written in Hangul, both menus and ingredients lists. For vegan restaurants, check <u>Happy</u>
 Cow – Seoul.

Sleep Cheap

★ Tourist accommodation is very expensive in South Korea. Usually the cheapest deals can be found in hostels or via Air BnB. Use <u>this link</u> for <u>€15 discount at</u> <u>Booking.com</u>. Get <u>€25 travel money for free</u> on Air BnB with <u>this link</u>.

 Camping is very affordable but can be terribly hot in summer and freezing cold in winter. Nanji Campground is ridiculously cheap.

 Jjimjilbangs are cheap Korean sauna's and include free overnight stays (*sleeping rooms*). Temple stays (Buddhist) are a bit pricier and can be done at Myogaksa, Geumseonsa, Bongeunsa, Jogyesa and Jingwansa. Book it <u>here</u>.

 Go <u>Couchsurfing</u> or Housesitting: get <u>20% off your</u> yearly <u>Trusted Housesitters membership</u> via <u>this link</u>.
 Also check <u>WorkAway</u>.

Nights Best Spent

• Nightlife areas: Hongik University Street (Hongdae), Gangnam, Itaewon.

 Theaters: National Theatre of Korea, Jeongdong Theatre, NANTA Theatre, Jump.

Free-Riding?

■ Seoul is huge. You can walk within parts of districts, but to get around you need alternative transport.

■ Biking is possible and there's an extensive bicycle lane network. Car drivers are however rather inconsiderate in Korea. <u>Bike Seoul</u> is a cheap bikeshare system.

■ Google Maps and Moovit don't work well here, download the KakaoMap or Naver app for route planning (mostly in Korean, but recognizes place names in alphabet and has a map-function). A <u>T-Money /</u> <u>Cashbee card</u> provides discounts and up to 4 free transfers daily to bus or metro (within 30 minutes), it can be bought and charged in all minimarkets and works all over South Korea. Swipe when entering and leaving the bus/metro. There are several bus terminals: Nambu, Express Bus Terminal, Yongsan, Seobu, Dong, Sangbong, Sinseol-Dong, Central City, Jegi-Dong.

■ Trains are operated by <u>Korail</u> and leave from the central train station. There are both expensive fast-trains as well as slower and very cheap local trains.

Airport: Incheon (ICN) & Gimpo (GMP) Airport.

Hitchhiking is possible, but rather hard in a big city as you'll mainly catch inner-city traffic.
