Budget Bites

- **Big supermarkets:** Sainsbury's, Iceland Foods, Waitrose.
- **Markets:** Bath Guildhall Market, (Bath Vintage & Antique Market).
- # Local food: Fish and Chips (deep-fried), Bangers and Mash (sausages and mashed potatoes), Black Pudding (blood and pork fat pudding), Shepherd's / Cottage Pie (lamb / beef pie), Steak and Kidney Pie Beef Wellington (pasty steak), Cornish Pasty (meat and vegetable pastry), Full English Breakfast (incl. baconbeans-sausages), Sunday Roast, Toad in the Hole (sausages in gravy), Scotch Egg (boiled eggs wrapped in sausage meat, then deep-fried), Haggis (minced sheep's heart, liver and lungs), Scones, Eton Mess (meringue and cream), Eccles Cake (pastry).
- **Go vegan:** Being vegan is ridiculously easy in Europe. <u>Local vegan dishes:</u> Laverbread (boiled and pureed seaweed), Bubble and Squeak (fried mashed potato with cabbage), Pease Pudding (with split peas), Water-based Porridge. Check vegan-friendly restaurants here: <u>Happy Cow Bath</u>. Also check out the by-now-basically-local Indian restaurants.

Sleep Cheap

- ❖ Hostels and alternative accommodation are very expensive in the UK, and even more so in Bath. (Wild) Camping is officially illegal, but you can get away with it if you're discrete.
- ❖ Go Couchsurfing or Housesitting (20% discount for Trusted Housesitters via this link!). Also check WorkAway or HelpX for work-exchanges.

Free-Riding?

- Walking is an excellent option to see the more subtle details of Bath.
- Biking is another fun way to explore downtown Bath. Bike rental is widely available.
- Bath city is connected with a reliable bus system, which is however quite expensive. For several journeys a day, a day pass is more economical. You can pay the driver. For intercity buses, your cheapest options are with budget lines like Megabus and Flixbus (especially when you book ahead), operating specific routes. For a wider bus network and more routes, use the local National Express. The buses leave from the front of the train station.
- Bath's main train station is called 'Bath Spa' and is connected frequently with cities such as Bristol, London, Reading, Cardiff, Salisbury, Southampton etc. Prices are more economical the earlier you book (it can get really expensive last minute).
- Airports: Bristol Airport (BRS), London Heathrow (LHR), London Gatwick (LGW), London Luton (LTN), Birmingham (BHX).
- Hitchhiking is relatively safe, but not too common. You can also use apps like <u>Blablacar</u> for a cheap ride.
